

Victoria amazonica Amazon lily

Exciting news reported by Dale Arvidsson and his crew: they have successfully flowered a rare lily and put it on display in the Japanese Garden pond at Mt Coot-tha BG.





Growing Friends

Welcome to 2017 and the start of the Kitchen Garden Project at the Botanic Gardens at Mt Coot-tha. For the first time volunteers from the Friends of Brisbane Botanic Gardens & Sherwood Arboretum (fbbgsa) have been invited to help maintain the gardens - in this case the Kitchen Garden.

Nine skilled gardening volunteers nominated to start the project by undertaking Safety Training conducted by the Brisbane City Council on Thursday 16 February. We were briefed on limbering up before we start, managing the weather conditions (heat and wet), keeping our gardening tools close (so we didn't fall over them!), and keeping ourselves safe from the public (errant vehicles and school kid mobs!), as well as the native wildlife (water dragons, turkeys, ticks, mozzies, flies, etc.), amongst other things.

We meet the BCC staff - Team Leader Mark and Tasha the Gardener - who look after the Kitchen Garden and will guide us through our regular monthly activities. Wednesday morning While viewing the site Dale told us about some of the native bush tucker and its use by Aboriginal people. We were surprised about some of the plants which gave fruit that we had in our own gardens and new plants like native mint.

The focus of the Kitchen Garden is to maintain a regular supply of fruit and vegetables for the educational workshops held in the gardens in the Kitchen in the Gardens building. Coming up:

- "Fresh Fast and Fabulous Meals Gold Program" run by the Nutrition Australia Qld (on 7 March)
- © "Spurtopia Workshop Food Fermentation" on 18 February
- Grow It, Cook It, Compost It" on 23 February

You may be thinking the nine of us joined so we can take home produce at the end of the day - not so! The Kitchen Garden is still a part of the Botanic Garden so a treasured collection of plants for all; if you want to take home produce at the end of the day any Community Garden will be happy to help with this.

We were all pleased to hear that the Kitchen Garden is supplied by tank water (rather than recycled water) with heaps of worm juice (locally produced) used for the plants and soil and only natural pesticides used in this garden. We will be responsible for the composter as well. Dale is keen to acquire locally grown seeds for the garden as they have better tolerance to the local conditions. So any of our members who are prepared to donate seed Dale will happily consider them if you know their botanical name (rather than self-sown by who knows what plant).

The MAIN FEATURE for the night was our Curator Friend, **Dale Arvidsson** discussing the excellent work he is doing for all three botanic treasures: City Botanic Gardens, Mt Coot-tha Botanic Gardens and Sherwood Arboretum.



It was so heartening to hear about the strategic planning going into the new Living Collections Policies. These will be the drivers for the future and help the current management and interpretation of the two botanic gardens and the arboretum. Dale's talk was a combination of revealing secret treasures and potential new pleasures all wrapped in a tasty feel-good package to conserve the plants of the planet for the good of all! One special insight was revealing the oldest plant in the Brisbane Botanic Gardens: Bambusa balcoola which was planted in Penal Settlement times.

Dale emphasised that Botanic Gardens were like Art Galleries or Museums with curated collections, but unlike those places, plants required long term strategies for replacement as well as maintenance.

So what do our places focus on? Mt Coot-tha BG has a breadth of living collection categories and a surprising number of indigenous Australian plants. Even unofficially, this place is the default Queensland Botanic Gardens and reflects the range of our State's bioregions as much as possible with the subtropical climate in mind. The gradual development of the Bunya

Mountain communities was exciting to hear and worrying that if climate change continues and involves the loss of cloud on those actual mountains, our collection in Brisbane might be the only place these plant communities remain! It is so important to maintain biodiversity in the wild but botanic gardens help with in situ and ex situ conservation. Representatives from the world's rainforest communities are here also and will be more clearly visible in the future.

We have a Tropicalian garden in the City as well. Dale listed five main categories of living collections: palms, gymnosperms (Pintetum), bamboo, figs and minor collections that together are highly evocative of the subtropics.

Sherwood Arboretum has an unusual historical collection of Australian trees as well as a wetland habitat collection.

The three different policies (one for each site) will be gradually compiled, approved and released during 2017. Friends of BBGSA will be there to show the way you can find the documents online to peruse and get excited. Effective botanic gardens need these Living Collections policies. Congratulations Dale for taking on this herculean task with such enthusiasm and skill.

THREAT ALERT!

What makes for inappropriate activities in a botanic garden? Disruptive mass markets that don't focus on horticultural, educational or aesthetic matters perhaps? Or huge outdoor concerts that impact directly on the quiet refuge and peacefulness of the place? Or maybe it's the clutter of outsized electrical switchboxes or memorials that are not connected to the history of the place.

For several months, Mary Jo Katter and Dr Jeannie Sim as members of the fBBGSA Board have been campaigning and lobbying against the imposition of a memorial into the City Botanic Gardens. We have talked to Brisbane City Council Councillors, representatives of the Oueensland Police Service (QPS) and our colleagues on the Lord Mayor's Parks and Gardens Advisory Committee. That committee agreed with sentiments and endorsed the Chair, Sallyanne Atkinson to write to the QPS stating opposition to the insertion of any memorial into the historic Botanic Gardens.

We have offered numerous suggestions for alternative sites around Brisbane and the CBD, but hopefully QPS will find the right place for their history to be commemorated. revealed and Meanwhile fBBGSA will continue to act to protect the integrity of our botanic treasures.

MEMORIALS are **IMPORTANT**

Memorials to fallen service people are much appreciated by our community and make important contributions to our urban places. one could contest significance. These memorials deserve locating in appropriate places, with strong connections to the history of those organisations.

The Fire Fighters of Queensland have their Memorial to those who have made the supreme sacrifice while carrying out their duties, on the corner of Oueen and Eagle Streets, Brisbane. They call it Mooney Memorial after the 17 year old volunteer James Mooney who died in 1877 as a result of fighting a fire in a general store in Queen Street and was the first fire fighter fatality in Queensland. There is a logical and emotional connection between the memorial and this place.

When the authentic connections and historic values match the strong social values, such memorials become beloved cultural heritage.

Mooney Memorial, originally built as a Drinking Fountain in 1878-1880, is listed on the Queensland Heritage Register.



The Queensland Police Service deserves a proper memorial in a location that has direct relevance to the QPS that enables quiet reflection in a safe and nonthreatening locale.

The QPS proposed location for the Memorial in the City Botanic Gardens is within the garden bed adjacent the Morning Star Lawn, which is at the George Street end of the old Queen's Park reserve along Alice Street.



Such a location conflicts with existing uses including Wedding functions and uninterrupted green views. The setting for the "Morning Star" artwork would also be compromised. And the Grevillea robusta tree will have to be removed to fit in the Memorial.



Herbaceous Plant Identification

Volunteer Friends of BBGSA, Arno King and Paul Plant are providing some expertise Curator Dale Arvidsson. Despite this wretched heat, they tramping through the undergrowth plotting plants into numbered garden beds. Jean Sim provided those numbers and rough plan layouts using data gathered in 2005 and earlier maps from 1995. This data will feed into the larger vegetation survey Dale coordinated with associated the Masterplan exercise. Some day in the future all this data will be publically accessible and provide excellent learning opportunities.

Gardens Point Study Revisited

OUT Landscape architecture students will be studying the OBBG for their third year design studio this year. Dr Sudipto Roy is leading the studio with guest lectures from Dale Arvidsson. Lawrie Smith. Shawn Walsh. Glenn Thomas and Jeannie Sim. Their goal is to produce a conceptual Master Plan for the whole of the Botanic Gardens and Domain property. A similar project was undertaken in 2016 focused on BBG, Mt Coot-tha with exciting results. The student ideas were shared with Dale Arvidsson and Darryl Mills as they prepare a Master Plan for BCC.

I prepared and delivered a new talk for the LA design studio last week. This digital presentation will be posted on our website in March as part of the revamped history interpretation of the OBBG we have in the works. The working team of fBBGSA members call ourselves the triptych: Marcus Richardson, Jim Dobbins and Jean Sim. Here are a few teasers from that talk:

NEWS!

MASTER PLAN

Brisbane City Council is well advanced on their Draft Master Plan for Brisbane Botanic Gardens, Mt. Coot-tha. It should be revealed to the public for comment by the end of March 2017. As soon as that is live on their website, we will notify our members so you can review for yourself the ideas and proposals.

Remember that this master plan exercise is a broad brush approach to find the key conceptual strategies for the future. Detail planning will come on a project by project basis.

Mary Jo and Jeannie as members of the Lord Mayor's Parks and Gardens Advisory Committee were privy to their initial draft. We were excited by many aspects of this well-prepared report and congratulate the team involved.

The Board of fBBGSA have some priority projects for MCBG that we want to ensure are not forgotten in this process, including:

- propagation nursery to ensure plant provenance and biosafety (with some room for Friends to activate their Growing Friends mandate)
- children's playground that is a plant learning garden (as in RBG Melbourne's Children's Garden)
- expanded Library facilities.

All the other well-known issues and improvements are well represented in the draft, for example effective wayfinding, universal access, better entry experience and so on.

What would be your pet peeve or dream for the gardens? Have your say directly to BCC when the Draft is released.

VISITOR CENTER

Construction has started on the new Visitor Information Centre at the end of the carpark near the Café. Some temporary changes in the car parking were necessary including using the shady driveway within the Australian Rainforest area for coaches and buses.

As soon as the official opening date is announced we will promote the event! Meanwhile, we can observe the progress and enjoy the spectacle! Here is the official BCC website for this facility:

TROPICAL DOME & **PLANTEARIUM**


Just an aside about these landmark and beloved structures.




